Frazier Park

Frazier Park is an unincorporated mountain community in Kern County, California, established in 1925 and named after nearby Frazier Mountain. The region's earliest recorded activity dates to 1854, when lumber from Frazier Mountain was harvested to support Fort Tejon; local Kitanemuk Indians referred to the area as Campo del Soldado ("Soldier's Camp"). According to the 2020 U.S. Census, Frazier Park's population stood at 2,592, down slightly from 2,691 in 2010. Frazier Park's appeal lies in its mountain charm and natural surroundings. It offers abundant outdoor recreational opportunities—from hiking and camping to exploring nearby peaks like Mount Pinos.

The Frazier Park Public Utility District (FPPUD) provides domestic water services to roughly 1,300 hookups, including residential customers and the local elementary school, supporting around 2,500 people. The five-member elected Board of Directors meets regularly on the second and fourth Thursdays of each month either via Zoom or in person at the district office. Agendas and meeting minutes are published on the district website in compliance with the Brown Act and transparency requirements.
